Teddy Bears for the Holidays

What child wouldn't want a cuddly teddy bear for the holidays? And who better to supply them than the members of our quilt guild? Starting with eighteen teddy bears from the Salvation Army in Hyannis, members dressed all the bears in a wide variety of outfits, ranging from the ballerina in pink satin and net tutu to the sturdy hockey player, complete with skates. Some clothing was hand-sewn; some were clothing for preemie babies who are the same size; some even came form a thrift store that Sandy Cahalane manages. We even have a few leftover outfits to start with in 2023!

The bears also have quilts and crocheted afghans to give to their new young owners. Some were made by the

same members who dressed the bears; others were small comfort quilts made by other members and provided for the bears by Jeanie and Micki. In addition to the eighteen original bears, there were five donated bears added to the original batch, for a total of 23 bears, 23 child-size quilts, 10 bear-size quilts, and even a matching pillowcase!

Bears and quilts were shown at he luncheon on December 8 to the delight of the members attending. They went back to the Salvation Army office in Hyannis a few days after the luncheon, and Major Dorie and her staff were thrilled to receive them. 
We Love a CHALLENGE, Don't We?!

Holly Berry Quilt Guild 2022-2023 Challenge "Can you smell the flowers?

Do you have a stash of floral fabrics? Do you have a flower pattern you've always wanted to try? Do you like the challenge of creating your own floral design? Go wherever your imagination takes you! We encourage everyone in the guild to participate in this challenge.



<u>#1 RULE: HAVE FUN!!!</u> Use your imagination! Your creation can be traditional or contemporary.




<u>**REQUIRED!:**</u> Your challenge must include at least one flower somewhere on the front of your quilted item. Your flower(s) can be pieced, appliqued, a floral fabric, modern or contemporary.

Item Selection: Your challenge can be a quilt, wall hanging, table runner or tote bag but it must be a "quilt"...3 layers including front, back and batting and quilted.

Finished Size: Your challenge can be any fin-

ished size you want.

<u>Methods of Construction</u>: You are free to use whatever construction or quilting methods work best for your creation (i.e., machine pieced, hand pieced, paper pieced, machine appliquéd, hand appliquéd, machine or hand quilted, etc.). We encourage you to challenge yourself and be creative.





Fabric Requirement: You can use whatever fabrics you want in your challenge. Your fabrics do not all have to be 100% cotton. There is also no limit to the total number of fabrics or kinds of fabrics used in your challenge.

Embellishments: Embellishments are optional.

<u>Due Date</u>: Completed challenges will be revealed at our June 8, 2023 guild meeting.

Quilting and the Environment: A SAQA Show at NEQN

In addition to exhibiting its own collection of antique and modern quilts and showcasing individual artists, the New England Quilt Museum in Lowell, Massachusetts, often hosts group shows with particular messages for the viewer. The show currently running until the end of 2022 is a case in point. The Studio Art Quilts Association show "SUSTAINABILITY: Solutions to Improve Our World" will be showing at the Museum until December 31.

The theme of the show is human society's interconnectedness with nature; the two– and three-dimensional works quilts in the show focus on how we can meet our own needs and still preserve the earth for future generations. If you are interested in protecting the environment or innovative quilting, this show is for you. Here are a few sample works from the exhibition.

From colonial times, quiltmakers have salvaged otherwise unusable bits of leftover fabric or worn clothing in piecework to make warm quilts for their families. Others used applique, especially broderie perse, to add beauty while making the most of a small piece of fabric.



Kat Puente uses *Sunlight Power,* a quilt made with fabric, paint, and yarn, to drive home the need for greater use of solar power and the clean energy it will provide to our homes and businesses.. She points out that solar energy is supposed to be providing 50% of our power needs by 2025. Just think—someday your sewing machine could be running on star power!



Cedar Swamp #5 by Pat Bishop portrays a family property, once used for cutting wood and now allowed to remain in its natural state. The densely quilted work is made from recycled linens and clothing that have been hand-dyed, stamped, discharge -dyed, machine quilted, and thread painted.



Laura Fogg made *Catch of the Day* mainly from plastic bags from our own trash. She points out in her commentary that if we each re-used each plastic bag once, only half as many would end up polluting our oceans.
