Making Knit Hats for Donations

Whether you invest in some of Carol Cameron's dyed yarns or just have some leftover yarns you can't bear to throw out, you might like to make a cap to keep someone less fortunate warm. Here are the directions for the knit caps that Mary Ann Karpinski makes by the dozen.



Here are Mary Ann's easy directions:

You can use worsted weight acrylic or wool. Grab scraps of yarn from your stash and make your hat all different colored strips, or make it plain. It's up to you.

Use size 8 circular needles, size 8 double pointed needles and worsted yarn. Cast on 72 (76, 80) on circular needle. K1, P1 for 10 rows. Then knit the body of the hat for a total of 40 (44, 48) rows. Switch to double pointed needles. Knit 2 together for 1 row, knit row. Continue these 2 rows till there are 8 (9, 10) stitches left. Cut tail and pull through stitches and tie off. Add a pom pom. I just change up the yarns and make misc. rows of colors.

If you don't have circular needles you can use straight needles and for the body just knit one row and purl one row for a total of 40 (44, 48) rows. You'll just have a seam to sew up.

Quilt As You Go String Blocks

At the January 12th meeting Mary Ann Karpinski demonstrated a great way to use up the miscellaneous strip scraps we all have in our stash. The blocks she demonstrated were done using the quilt-as-yougo method (QAYG), You layer a backing square and batting slightly larger than your finished block will be; your blocks can be any size you want. Then flip and sew strips to the sandwich.





There are quite a few sites online that demonstrate how this is done. Here are a few that are easy to follow:

Grab your strip scraps, batting scraps and misc. squares for your backing and have fun.



60° Ruler Work and Four-Patch Kaleidoscopes

Our in-house demos continued this month with a workshop on the 60° ruler and the four-patch kalei-doscope, presented by Penny Bartlett and Louise Prussack. Some members shared their work with 60° rulers, as you can see from the pictures on this page. They look complicated, but the construction is actually easier than you would expect

The ruler is an equilateral triangle that comes in several sizes. Here's an example:



The secret is cutting beautiful striped fabric very carefully with this ruler, and then rotating the cut pieces to form a hexagon like the one Gail is holding.



One is not limited to hexagons, however. Take a look at these more complex designs that were shown at the demo:



Many commercial patterns are available for table toppers and runners like these, and you can use the same technique to make a full quilt. If you missed the demo, you can find an excellent video on this at https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=K2x2ll6T60Q.

Four-patch kaleidoscopes are even simpler. Using the "Stack and Whack" method with four layers, line up the fabric very carefull and then cut squares. Match four squares to form a kaleidoscope. The beginning of the video at https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=CwfdLNjjxdo&t=387s teaches how to cut and assemble them, if you need to review the directions from the demo or if you were unable to attend. Here are two of Penny's lovely blocks:





If you don't want to cut your own, member Ellen Flaherty recommends www.labfabrics.com, which has pre-cut fabrics and free downloadable patterns for kaleidoscopes.


Are You Rising to the Challenge?

#1 RULE: HAVE FUN!!! Use your imagination! Your creation can be traditional or contemporary.






<u>REQUIRED!</u>: Your challenge must include at least one flower somewhere on the front of your quilted item. Your flower(s) can be pieced, appliqued, a floral fabric, modern or contemporary.


<u>Item Selection:</u> Your challenge can be a quilt, wall hanging, table runner or tote bag but it must be a "quilt"...3 layers including front, back and batting and quilted.

Finished Size: Your challenge can be any fin-

ished size you want.

<u>Methods of Construction:</u> You are free to use whatever construction or quilting methods work best for your creation (i.e., machine pieced, hand pieced, paper pieced, machine appliquéd, hand appliquéd, machine or hand quilted, etc.). We encourage you to challenge yourself and be creative.





Fabric Requirement: You can use whatever fabrics you want in your challenge. Your fabrics do not all have to be 100% cotton. There is also no limit to the total number of fabrics or kinds of fabrics used in your challenge.

Embellishments: Embellishments are optional.

<u>Due Date:</u> Completed challenges will be revealed at our June 8, 2023 guild meeting.
