2024 Challenge Quilt



"It's All in a Name"

Our challenge for 2024 is "It's All in a Name." Using the first letters of your name, find colors that correspond with those letters and make something using those colors. You may use your first, middle and last name. You may also include your maiden name or confirmation name if you need to use lots of colors.

If you search online for "colors that begin with...," you'll find colors you never knew existed. You can make anything you want, like a quilt, wall hanging, table runner, tote bag, etc. Challenges will be revealed at our second meeting in September. Preemie Quilts Needed

Mary Ann Karpinski has a contact that is collecting small quilts for the NICU (Neonatal Intensive Care Unit). If you would like to make little quilts for babies in the NICU, the size requirements are below.



Please make the quilt tops cheerful and use dark fabrics for the backing of the quilts. The NICU puts the quilts over the incubators and isolettes to help block out the bright lights so the babies will sleep. Also don't

heavily quilt them; the light shouldn't shine through the needle holes. We know it's hard to not put something brightly colored on the back of a baby quilt, but they really prefer the darker colors to block the lights.

> Preemie size: 24" x 24" Incubator and isolette sizes: 24" x 36" or 44" x 44"

Comfort Quilts

The Comfort Quilt Ladies will be bringing kits to meetings for the rest of the year. We ask that you take a couple of kits with the intention of returning completed items in the Oct/Nov time frame. This will allow for holiday distribution. The size of the quilts can be smaller than the three-yard quilts as many go to the two-years-and-under population.

The kits will not all have directions but we will have a few different sets of directions available. The amounts of fabric in the kits will vary. Some will have enough for backing and some will not. Upon completion of your tops, you can contact Penny asking for the appropriate size batting.

Remember we ask that every member does at least one Comfort Quilt each year. Last year the guilt distributed 120 completed guilts. There are many saleable items that will be available that have been donated and will have a price of 1/3 original cost; there are also \$1 fat quarters. Please support us with purchasing these items. There will be a transition with new members taking over our responsibilities with comfort quilts and we would like to make it a smooth transition without major quantities of fabric. Two containers with measured amounts of fabric will be kept by us and brought to the Ways and Means in October for all members to make purchases.

We would like to thank the members for all they have done to make our Comfort Quilt years a big success.

The Thornton Burgess Commemorative Quilt



Born in 1874 in the village of Sandwich, Thorton Burgess grew up to become the author of more than 170 children's books and 15,000 stories, marked by a gentle love of nature and a sense of whimsy. His beloved characters include Peter Rabbit, Danny Meadow Mouse, Jerry Muskrat, Chatterer the Red Squirrel, and many, many more. His influence remains on Cape Cod, most notably at the Green Briar Nature Center in East Sandwich.

To commemorate the 150th anniversary of his birth, Liz Henry was asked to create a quilt that reflects the themes of Burgess' work. She enlisted the assistance of Shirley Ladetto, and the two women designed and sewed the quilt pictured above. The patterns were designed by Ruby Short McKim, a quilter who was a contemporary of Burgess. A book with the original "Quaddy Quilty Bedtime Quilt" patterns and a panel which shows the designs printed in color are both still available from the McKim Studio at www.mckimstudios.com.

The quilt is currently on display at the Sandwich Library, at 142 Main Street in Sandwich. Be sure to stop by to see it!

Holly Berry member Shirley Ladetto and her friend and fellow quilter Liz Henry created the quilt in honor of the author Thorton Burgess.

The Joys of Collecting: Old Treasures and New at Highfield Hall

The Highfield Hall Museum in Falmouth is currently presenting a quilt show entitled "The Legacy of Pattern: The Quilter's Lexicon." The lexicon or dictionary is the treasury of quilt patterns that centuries of quilters have created in both appliquéé and piecing. The show presents numerous quilts from the late 19th century to contemporary quilts. As Highfield's brochure points out, some were made as art pieces, others just to keep the quilters' families warm through cold winters. A few examples are shown below.

Quilts were borrowed from both well-known contemporary quilters like Victoria Findlay Wolfe and from local owners who have kept these treasures safe. Most were in exceptionally fine condition. Several members of our Holly Berry guild lent antique quilts and the guild itself lent our portable quilting stand. The guild is graciously thanked in the brochure accompanying the exhibit.

The show will run Tuesday-Saturday until May 12.





The Grandmother's Flower Garden (above left), made in New York around 1929, is one of the two antique quilts lent by Marge Overholtz. It is an excellent example of a traditional pattern based on hexagons with hundreds of small pieces..

This Dear Jane quilt (above right) by Eleanor Mueller, Penny Bartlett's mother, was made using patterns developed by Jane Stickle in 1863 as she waited for relatives to return from the Civil War.

The Conway Quilt, also by Eleanor Mueller, is a modern example of the style of Baltimore Album quilts, popularized in the 1840s. The Dear Jane and Conway quilts were lent by Penny Bartlett.
